Chiantelli's effectiveness as a mediator is probably not surprising to those who knew him as a judge.

Chiantelli, who had the challenging task of serving as San Francisco's first presiding judge after California's municipal and superior courts were unified in 1998, said he gained a reputation for being a successful settlement judge during his years on the bench. Other superior court judges would often send him tough-to-settle cases to see if he could resolve them.

He said he enjoyed the various roles he played with the court, although he took great interest in civil trials for all of the unique legal issues they presented.

"It's like reading a short story every day," he said.

Chiantelli works these days out of an office at ADR Services named after Lucca, Italy, where his family hails from. He said the keys to being a good mediator are listening to both sides, being fair and persistent and keeping people committed to the process.

"Settlements aren't events," he explained. "It's a process of keeping people at the table."

While being a likeable personality doesn't hurt either, that's certainly no guarantee that people will think you're a good arbitrator, Chiantelli said.

"I just happen to be lucky people like to go to dinner with me and like [the way I do] mediations."
